Email 2/11/19 from Bob re Fire Chief comments: Bob, I think I would have a hard time supporting this wording. While the newest NFPA codes require residential sprinkling systems, this has not been adopted by Maine. It is a major cost driver, especially when a municipal charged system is not present. In addition to the cost of installing sprinkling systems, a system for underground water would be nice to have for the fire department's use, but the maintenance and upkeep of these systems would be a considerable effort for the department members once they are installed. As many departments, we rely on tanker shuttle for the remote areas of town. I am afraid this ordinance wording would drive major costs into construction and hinder development. If there is something that will be adopted, it should apply to mobile home parks as well as regular development, due to the closer proximity to other structures, their construction techniques, and general condition, this is where a quick water supply would be critical to keeping the fire from spreading from building to building. I would greatly like to see a push to extend the hydrant system towards the other areas of Town and perhaps work that into the longer term plans for the Town as this would help drive development and provide for virtually unlimited water for firefighting.
